Trinity MSH Extension Possible; Key Updates Planned for Feb. 6

At the upcoming **Feb. 6 Select Board meeting** with **Trinity representatives** and the **Medfield State Hospital Re-Development Committee** in attendance, town officials anticipate Trinity will seek a **one-year extension** to the original closing date of **March 31, 2024**.

At a special town meeting on June 21, 2022, Medfield voters gave their near-unanimous blessing to the Board of Selectmen (as previously named) to sell an estimated 45 acres of former **Medfield State Hospital (MSH) property to Trinity Financial** for the creation of 334 rental units in restored historic buildings.

Given that Trinity would need a period of due diligence, permitting, and time to secure significant public and private funding, the March 2024 closing date was set. However, the **Land Disposition Agreement** (LDA) also gave Trinity the option to request two six-month extensions, if needed.

The LDA notes "time is of the essence" regarding closing the MSH sale to Trinity. However, beyond the usual challenges, certain unique steps, such as federal project reviews and approval of historic tax credits, plus firing range mitigation efforts, have also eaten into the timeline.

On a separate but parallel path with Trinity is the redevelopment of the former Lee Chapel and the adjacent infirmary building by Bellforge Arts Center. Bellforge has submitted a citizen's petition for Town Meeting 2024 that if passed, would open a path for purchasing

the properties instead of leasing them from the town. It is expected that the Select Board will discuss the petition as part of its review of warrant articles, although it is not clear if that particular discussion will take place on Feb. 6 or at a later date.

MSH Movie Follow-up

In related news and as a follow-up to last week's article about "The Holdovers" production at MSH, if Trinity executes the one-year delay, the site will be available once again for movie making, according to Town Administrator Kristine Treirweiler.

"We had to pause securing movies due to the timing of Trinity closing on the property," she said.

Treirweiler also shared that the town was paid \$20,000 for using MSH for "The Holdovers," and that any proceeds from movie agreements are placed in a MSH revolving account and used for grounds maintenance.

Town Budget Discussions Provide Department Insights

As the Warrant Committee meets with town departments to discuss fiscal year 2025 budgets, other items of interest invariably surface.

Below are tidbits of information gleaned from recent budget reviews that may not be common knowledge.

Department of Public Works (Water, Sewer, Roads) is:

- * Working to reduce the amount of phosphorus (primarily from lawn/yard fertilizers) entering the Charles River, with community education an important component;
- * Budgeting to maintain new water treatment plant off Elm Street at a cost of about \$25,000 annually (for propane, electricity);
- * Navigating significant challenges with an aging Wastewater Treatment Plant and related sewer issues; and
- * Focusing on Hartford Street as yet another road needing attention due to flooding.

Fire Department is:

- * Relying on mutual aid since Medfield does not have enough paramedics;
- * Needing to recruit one or two new captains due to a resignation and possible retirement. ([Long-time Medfield Captain Eric Littman is now Fire Academy director](#));
- * Needing to hiring more inspectors for an increasing number of solar projects; and
- * Taking a "Swiss Army Knife" approach to hiring, i.e., bringing on personnel who can do multiple jobs vs. specialists -- especially since EMT calls now account for a larger share of Fire Department work.

Police Department is:

- * Recruiting and retaining more officers, but it is still an ongoing challenge;
- * Needing to increase salary line item (up 10 percent) due to a variety of factors, including new collective bargaining agreements, educational incentives, and overtime; and
- * Exploring a regional dispatch model to save costs (staff presence at desk would still be desired during certain hours).

Facilities Maintenance is:

- * Benefiting from reduced electricity costs at town garage (by \$20,000) due to solar installation/use; and
- * Managing emergency repair costs for town buildings (\$175,000 expense).

Treasurer/Collector is:

- * Managing about 25 to 30 trust funds set up for various purposes, including cemetery and library use, and for town stabilization. Most have trust fund documents and each fund can be invested in accordance with state law.

Land Use/Planning is:

- * Spending about \$1,500 annually in newspaper legal ads, but is trying to get more applicants to cover the expense for private projects;
- * Continuing to use consultants as a necessary expense; and
- * Looking forward to using Opengov.com to streamline and improve project tracking across town boards, and foster coordination.

Town Clerk Prepares for Multiple Elections

The antique ballot box (*shown*) continues to serve as a reminder of how elections were once handled in Medfield.

Fast forward to the 21st century, and Town Clerk Marion Bonoldi is again preparing for a busy year of elections supported by modern technology that no one could have imagined more than 100 years ago.

The **2024 election schedule** is now set, and election wardens and inspectors have been appointed by the Select Board.

Friday, March 15 is the **last day to register to vote for the town election** on March 25, 2024.

Committees Consider MSBA Once Again for Dale Project

Each year around this time, Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) invites towns and school districts to submit a Statement of Interest for a school building project that would benefit from an MSBA grant.

After the application deadline closes in April, MSBA spends about eight months deciding on the final candidates to invite into its program. Last year, out of 63 submissions, 19 school districts were invited into the eligibility period during which they must meet certain objectives in order to proceed into subsequent stages.

According to MSBA, its grants are "non-entitlement," and a district's acceptance into the program does not guarantee state funding. However, once MSBA invites a district into its program (which MSBA records show takes about 3-5 years after a failed vote), it is rare for the MSBA to terminate the relationship prematurely.

When evaluating a district for support, [MSBA explains](#) it bases its maximum reimbursement grant on a number of factors, including local income levels, property valuations, and poverty levels.

As Medfield Warrant Committee, School Building Committee, School Committee and Select Board evaluate the pros and cons of the MSBA program in the weeks ahead, based on MSBA and other data, key questions to consider:

- * **What should be the assumed MSBA reimbursement rate for cost-benefit modeling purposes?** Based on [MSBA data for more than 30 recently audited school projects](#), none of the towns and cities achieved the stated base reimbursement rate. In fact, many earned far below it. For the Dale Street School project, while MSBA had stated a base reimbursement rate of 39.84 percent, the actual value as of Oct. 27, 2021, just weeks before Special Town Meeting, was 23.5 percent based on a total project cost of \$81 million and an MSBA grant of \$19 million.
- * **How might a renovation influence classroom size and related costs?** While MSBA requires 900 square foot classrooms in a new school, for a renovated school, it will consider smaller classrooms, as explained in its [regulations](#). Flexibility with classroom size can help to reduce building costs.
- * **How much extra time, if any, should be factored into a school project due to the MSBA program and its requirements, and what might be the cost of that time?** According to [a senior project manager at The Vertex Companies](#), a school building project management firm currently working on two Wellesley elementary schools -- one in the MSBA program, and the other self-funded, "It is reasonable to assume that proceeding with a project without MSBA can shave **one year plus/minus off** of a project duration with all other things being equal." For a \$70-million school project faced with an annual escalation cost of 5 percent, the price of a one-year delay could be \$3.5 million based on project costs alone (i.e., without ongoing maintenance and repair costs also factored in).

- *** What additional grants are available to help reduce costs?** MSBA had previously prohibited use of other third-party grants to lower the town share of a school project, but the MSBA board recently voted to allow districts to tap into additional funding sources. [Renewable energy grants and low-cost financing options](#) seem to be increasing for school projects.
- *** What is the price of local control?** MSBA must review and approve a variety of documents and decisions both large and small throughout a school building project. During certain steps, MSBA can overshadow local decision-making, and in some cases cause a project to be more expensive than needed. For example, during the Dale Street School designer selection process, [MSBA recruited more than a dozen reviewers](#) to rate designers, while only a few district representatives were allowed to weigh in. And when Medfield initially sought to lower its design enrollment to achieve a slightly smaller and less expensive building footprint, MSBA was not amenable to the request without imposing a significant delay on the district, [according to public records.](#)

After holding multiple public hearings over the last few months, MSBA is now in the process of reviewing feedback on its [proposed regulations](#), and considering additional changes. It is expected that new regulations will be reviewed and approved by the MSBA Board of Directors on Wednesday, Feb. 28.

- *** Anyone planning to run for office can obtain nomination papers** from the Town Clerk office. Papers with at least 50 certified signatures must be returned by **5 p.m., Feb. 5, 2024**. Information on the election and all open positions can be found on the [town website](#).
- *** State Representative Denise Garlick**, who represents Medfield precincts 1 and 2, will be delivering her annual **Report to the Community** at 7 p.m., Thursday, Feb. 8 in the Public Safety Building on North Street, and also via Zoom and Medfield TV channels. - *** At its Feb. 1 meeting, Conservation Commission** voted to accept the **withdrawal of the Notice of Intent for 0 High St.**, an undeveloped lot bordering significant wetlands and Nantasket Brook. In other business, hearings for 10 Overfield Drive and 26-30 Millbrook Rd. were continued to Feb. 15. Also scheduled for Feb. 15 is the violation/enforcement order for 37-39 Green St., and the 7 Jade Walk trail project hearing, which will be reopened due to a technicality.
- *** Conservation Commission** is scheduled to discuss the **Danielson Pond** project with the **Select Board on Feb. 20**. In the meantime, a crew has been working to remove the fallen tree and execute repairs under an emergency repair order. It was reported that while the work was underway, representatives from Massachusetts Office Dam Safety showed up at the pond to assess the site.

- * Dog license renewal forms and a \$10 payment per dog is due to the town clerk by April 1, 2024. According to [town regulations](#), a late fee of \$25 will be assessed for renewals received after April 1. Additionally, after July 1, a \$100 fine per dog, per year, will be issued to dog owners who fail to license their animals.
