Political signs keep disappearing

On a related note, Medfield is one of many communities across the country experiencing missing political lawn signs. *The Boston Sunday Globe* mentioned Medfield in the Oct. 27 paper, community members have been expressing concerns on social media, and Medfield Police have been notified of numerous incidents over many weeks (and the department will continue to take resident complaints).

In Old Lyme, Connecticut, a man was caught on camera stealing a political sign earlier this month, according to [Eyewitness News 3](#). In other states, citizens have been placing tracking devices on their signs allowing police to track down the thieves. In central Massachusetts, [CBS News recently reported](#) that political signs were set on fire on a residential lawn.

Upcoming Meetings Tackle Topics,

Allow for Public Input before Vote

Medfield may be considered a small town, but there's a lot going on, and big discussions (some with votes) are coming up in the weeks ahead.

Among the **key topics** (there are others not noted):

- * **Montrose School** project follow-up (especially regarding **traffic**), **and artificial turf field review, as part of a larger site plan**. Public hearings have begun, and it's possible that on **Monday, Nov. 4**, Planning Board will continue Montrose discussions, including review of a traffic engineering report that raised concerns, especially at the Brook Street and Rte. 109 intersection. [A video clip of the discussion is available here](#). Then on **Thursday, Nov. 7**, Conservation Commission has tentatively scheduled a hearing about the Montrose proposal, with a focus on the artificial turf field. Board of Health will also take up the field topic -- likely in November (it is not noted on the Oct. 29 meeting agenda).
- * **School Building Committee site selection for Dale Street School project**. The committee plans to vote on [Wednesday, Nov. 6](#) at its regularly scheduled meeting that begins at 7 p.m. This vote is for planning purposes so the project can keep moving forward with or without Massachusetts School Building Authority (that Authority decision is due mid-December). Committee members have said that

based on extensive survey results and other public input (also welcome at the meeting), the consensus is to keep the school on its current site.

- *** Change in school start times.** On **Thursday, Nov. 14**, Medfield School Committee expects to vote on a change in new school start and dismissal times for **2025-26 school year** so that middle school and high school students can begin school **nearly an hour later** than currently. This change will necessitate **elementary students** starting school **nearly a half hour earlier** than now. Dismissal times will generally change to the same degree, with [details available here](#). Research shows later start times provide **student health and academic benefits** for adolescents. However, the change is not without challenges, including the potential for **significant morning traffic tie-ups, especially since Montrose School begins most days at 8 a.m.** -- the same time now proposed for elementary schools, and amidst peak commuter traffic (*see link to Montrose-related video clip above*). Even without Montrose in the mix, Medfield Police have been trying to find ways to unsnarl school traffic tie-ups. Other potential challenges include **longer bus rides** for students (due to traffic), and conflicts with **childcare**, student **jobs** and certain sports schedules. A community forum was held in May **before any specific start/end times were made public**, and without traffic studies conducted (unlike other districts that have made changes). As a result, School Committee has been fielding questions and concerns since the start of the school year as parents process the potential personal impact of changes less than a year away. - *** Proposed 40B project on former alpaca farm property at 86 Plain Street with 24 units planned.** Hearings recently started with Conservation Commission reviewing wetlands boundaries to reach mutual agreement with the developer. Wednesday, Oct. 30 is the deadline for citizens and the town (representing multiple boards) to submit comments to [Kat Miller of Mass Housing](#), the financing agency reviewing the 40B proposal. - *** Continued Select Board discussion of off-leash designated areas in town, most notably behind Wheelock School.** No specific date has been set, but based on the last meeting, it is on the board radar.

Water/Sewer Bills to Arrive Soon;

Drought Declaration Skips Medfield *(for now)*

Bills for town water and sewer service will be mailed to Medfield customers on **Nov. 4, 2024**, according to Department of Public Works Director Maurice Goulet.

The bills will reflect water and sewer rate increases of 5 and 4 percent respectively, as approved by Medfield Board of Water and Sewerage on Sept. 16. [The new rates, as of Oct. 1, can be found here.](#)

Rate increases are influenced by many variables, including the operating budget, current and future capital projects, drops in customer revenue (oftentimes tied to weather patterns that cause a reduction in outdoor water use), and the need to have a "rainy day fund" of retained earnings to deal with uncertain water demand or unanticipated expenses. Helping customers track use, costs

The Board of Water and Sewerage had anticipated moving to quarterly billing (vs. biannual currently) in 2024 to help customers keep closer tabs on their water/sewer service costs. However, that change may not happen until 2025.

At the same time, the DPW is in the process of installing more advanced meter-reading systems as another way customers can check on water usage on a more frequent basis to avoid billing surprises.

If a water/sewer bill is higher than normal, DPW notes on the town website it could be caused by certain situations, such as:

- * A new meter installation that replaced a stopped meter;
- * A leaky faucet or toilet;
- * An extended period sprinkler system use; or
- * Irrigation leaks.

Based on [division regulations](#), customers have the right to seek an adjustment of their water bills within 60 days in certain situations, such as billing errors, incorrect meter readings, or lack of a connection to the town system during the billing period. If an adjustment is denied, it can be appealed by written letter to the Board of Water and Sewerage within 30 days.

Medfield Not Part of Drought Declaration

On Oct. 11, the Massachusetts Drought Management Task Force [declared a "mild drought"](#) in the Northeast Region and part of the Southeast Region, but Medfield was not included in the declaration.

However, if the dry weather continues, the task force may add Medfield and adjacent towns to the list, which would then trigger water bans.

Town is Awarded \$500K
to Support MSH Project

Medfield is now slated to receive [\\$500,000 from a state grant](#) for redevelopment of the former Medfield State Hospital (MSH) property with Trinity Financial, according to Massachusetts Executive Office of Economic Development.

The state agency announced via an [Oct. 24 press release](#) its fiscal-year 2025 One-Stop-for-Growth grants totaling more than \$161 million, of which Medfield is one of 171 community beneficiaries.

As noted on the state website, funds for Medfield will be provided through the **HousingWorks** program (one of many grants bundled under the One Stop application process) to support “construction of the public road network and utilities required to put a dilapidated former state-owned property back into productive use.”

To date, the Commonwealth has granted Medfield \$5.5 million of support for the MSH redevelopment project over the past three years, mostly for **infrastructure needs**, but also for a small amount of **remediation**. Additionally, Bellforge Arts Center benefited from a \$600,000 grant for **chapel remediation**, which has been completed.

Town Administrator Kristine Trierweiler shared that engineers were recently on site to prepare the former MSH site for installation of electrical lines and other utilities. Road and off-site intersection planning are also underway.

Based on initial financial projections, it was estimated that \$30 million total would be needed for infrastructure purposes for the Trinity redevelopment of the MSH property.

Other progress noted...

As also reported by Treirweiler, the MSH development team has been advancing building design while coordinating closely with Town officials on various issues.

"Recently, the project secured its first allocation of state historic tax credits, with Massachusetts Historical Commission awarding \$100,000 per building, totaling **\$2.7 million**," as noted in the [Oct. 15 Town Administrator newsletter](#).

The credits, based on qualified restoration expenses associated with MSH buildings on the **National Register of Historic Places**, will help to reduce certain taxes associated with the project.

Still to be determined: A date for Trinity and Medfield to close on the sale of the property so that Trinity can assume official ownership. Based on revised timelines, the closing was anticipated in March 2025, but **could be delayed further**.

Trinity representatives had hoped to provide quarterly update presentations to Select Board, so a project status report is possible before the end of the calendar year.

In the meantime, security of the former MSH continues to be a challenge with a recent break-in and burglary reported in the police log. Allegedly someone had attempted to live in one of the buildings.

(Editor's note: A Trinity representative was contacted on Friday afternoon for input on the recent state grant, but no response was received in time for this article.)

Easement Misstep Clears Way for Gristmill Gate Installation

When the Select Board discussed in September a resident proposal to install a **locked gate** on his private property at 6 Grist Mill Rd. – abutting the town-owned **Kingsbury Pond Gristmill** on Route 27 -- attendees noted that a [signed and notarized 1992 conservation easement document](#) prohibited the structure.

At the time, town counsel and Select Board members appeared to place weight on the terms noted in the document. However, it was recently discovered, and confirmed by Select Board Chair Eileen Murphy, that the **agreement was never fully executed** by the town. Flags now mark the area where the gate will be installed.

When the conservation easement was initially created, it was to ensure that residents of the **Grist Mill Road subdivision** had access to the pond and adjacent trail that ran along 6 Grist Mill Rd. -- a step designed to enhance their enjoyment of the area and property values.

Murphy did not know how the final steps to execute the agreement **fell through town cracks more than 30 years ago**, but it's likely a related warrant article will be brought forth to May 2025 town meeting to rectify the situation. It is also unclear if other easements for sewer and open space/conservation, as noted in subdivision plans, are affected by lack of town actions when deed-related documents were finalized by developer Ralph Costello.

In the meantime, it has been deemed that the Courtney family, who own 6 Grist Mill Rd., has the right to install the locked gate, despite objections from abutters, who along with the Courtneys, belonged to the longstanding neighborhood association when the gate proposal first came before Conservation Commission review in July. The commission voted in favor of the Courtneys after seeing no wetlands-related risk with the gate installation.

The proposed gate is intended to **block vehicle access** to the easement area which includes the **circular turnaround** behind the gristmill – a site Tom Courtney alleges has been frequented by late-night cars. Only

public safety and town officials will have keys to the gate.

Still to be determined is the fate of a **memorial bench** (*seen in background of flag photo*), and other Eagle Scout projects created over the years, located on the Courtney property.

The memorial bench honors two World War II veterans missing in action, Douglas MacKeachie and Richard Werner. It was installed in June 2017 during a [special town ceremony](#). Deed records show the Courtneys purchased 6 Grist Mill Rd. in July 2018.

According to the [state website](#), the season opens Nov. 1 and ends April 15. Kennedy noted that when beavers clog dams during drought conditions and rain follows, flooding is more likely.
