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GREETINGS!

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This year's IUATLD meeting in Copenhagen offered a deep dive into the breadth of tuberculosis research, advocacy, and art. Highlights were sessions focused on drug-drug interactions in TB treatment, evolving definitions and outcomes in post-TB lung disease, progress in PAN-TB regimens, advances in long-acting TB therapeutics and new drugs, and updates from the pediatric SURE trial.

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A particularly powerful moment came from TB survivor and artist Paulina Siniatkina, whose House of Rays installation bridged personal, societal, and clinical aspects of TB. The expression of lived experiences in TB was a focal point throughout the meeting.

The meeting was inspiring and motivating, bringing together individuals from diverse disciplines and countries, and was a window into the impressive body of work being carried out.

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DC UPDATE

Government is open until January 30, 2026: Congress worked out a deal to re-open the government through January 30, 2026, using a continuing resolution (CR). Regular work is underway for the remaining appropriations bills for fiscal year '26 (FY26), including the "LaborHHS" bill that covers funding for the CDC. Congressional Leaders need to hear from their colleagues a strong message about strengthening our public health infrastructure. Therefore, our top action is to continue to ask your Representative in the House and two Senators to ask Leadership to pass \$225 million for CDC's TB programs for FY26. The Capitol Switchboard is **1-202-224-3121**.

Sample script 1: As your constituent and a public health advocate, I urge you to speak out in favor of strong funding for the CDC's TB programmatic and research funding. Since TB anywhere is TB everywhere, we cannot afford the risk of further increased rates of transmission or drug resistance. The Formula For Better Health: How to Save Millions of Lives Including Your Own By Tom Frieden, MD, MPH

As the market-friendly title of Tom Frieden's *The Formula For Better Health: How to Save Millions of Lives Including Your Own* suggests, the book does contain

personal advice, but it is not just another guide for determining one's optimal number of steps and carbohydrates. Instead, while much of the focus is on the three primary threats to health Frieden identified during his time running New York City's health department under Mayor Bloomberg –cigarette smoke, high levels of salt in processed food, and sugary sodas–the informing experiences of all of his efforts lie in his earlier fight against the early 1990's MDR-TB outbreak in New York followed by five years fighting TB in India. In those situations, he learned to deal with obstinate private and public officials, broken systems, and a public lacking the tools and information to make well-informed personal decisions.

Frieden adopts a tripartite approach to health issues: *See* the problem, *Believe* that a solution is possible, and *Create* a plan to solve it. Along the way he discusses the contributing factors to the "Cassandra curse", i.e. why people ignore warnings; how to create effective systems that embody simplicity, speed, and scalability; and the critical importance of insuring that message, messenger, and target audience are all in alignment to achieve progress in spite of opposition.

Frieden's advice delves deeply into his experience, but it is primarily a forward looking book much in the way of Sam Daley Harris's *Reclaiming Our Democracy* (TB Wire: July 2025), using stories of past successes (and in Frieden's case, some failures) as a springboard for his advice. In contrast, Frieden's successor in the NYC health department, Tom Farley, looks back at Frieden's tenure and his own, with the lessons of *Saving Gotham* being implicit rather than the ultimate focus. Of special note for TB advocates in *Saving Gotham* is the repeated question of "How do we make people care?" It's difficult enough to affect change as when someone is presented with threats to their own health they will often respond "Why shouldn't I smoke/drink/consume trans fats and sodium- I'm going to die anyway?" But how do you mobilize people to commit to improving the lives of others–after all, how many in power view the massive loss of life stemming from USAID cuts to TB and HIV programs as a statistic rather than a tragedy ¹?

The NYC health department found that death gets neatly shunted away as "part of life" but suffering is what gets people's attention. It is one thing to tell someone tobacco and excessive sodium are life threatening, but it is far more effective to present them with a threat to their *quality of life*–such as breathing through a tracheostomy, or being permanently disabled due to a hypertension-induced stroke: that is what moves the public to accept smoking bans and reduced salt in their diet. Those who've seen the documentary *Out of Breath* (TB Wire: September 2024) cannot forget the sight of Kim Taesung struggling with every breath as if it were a marathon. But what is too much to show? At what point will the viewer become numb to the message, or just turn away in denial and revulsion? And when one is dealing with infectious disease, there's the issue of fear and stigma making the message counter-productive: Suffering from TB is anything but romantic, but how much reality should one broadcast before the infected and potentially infected avoid treatment and testing, fearing how the rest of the community may respond? After all, HIV/AIDS is no longer a death sentence, but PrEP campaigns certainly don't focus on tell-tale purplish lesions from Kaposi's sarcoma and explosive diarrhea.³

While other advocacy books the "TB Bookshelf" has covered–namely John Green's *Everything is Tuberculosis* (TB Wire: April 2025) and Daley-Harris's *Reclaiming our Democracy*–focus on overcoming systemic obstacles to public health, such as institutional racism and simple ignorance, *The Formula for Better Health* explicitly calls out specific targets: Frieden excoriates the Trump administration for its messaging of COVID-19 and criticizes Joe Biden's CDC for prioritizing consistency over transparency. He's also publicly denounced tobacco executives by name as mass murderers. Given that as this column goes to print, the Trump administration has just followed up cuts to TB and HIV treatment with a rejection of World's AIDS Day, as if to put into practice the ACT UP warning *Silence=Death* ², maybe it's time for TB advocates to not only create systems embodying "*See. Believe. Create.*," but also follow Stop TB USA Coordinating Board member Sophie Huddart's advice: "[...]push ourselves to be louder: more ambitious, more rock 'n' roll. This disease

should not be killing people in 2025, and we have to start screaming until it's true."
