Here we are again. The annual letter. Easiest way to try to stay in touch and share family news.

Kids, big ones and little ones, are all doing well. Georgia (Kate and Brian Cote's daughter, Eileen's granddaughter) is in Kindergarten. She's 6 going on 16. Fun, funny, and full of life. Jake (Nicole and Rob's son, Eileen's grandson) is 14 and a freshman in high school. He played Professor Callahan in "Legally Blonde" - a wonderful production put on by his middle school last spring. He was amazing and a bit of show stealer. So proud of him.

All the other nieces and nephews are now young adults and in college or working. Emmy (Ashley's daughter, Bobby's granddaughter) works for Goldman Sachs in Manhattan. Renee (Michael and Michelle's daughter) did her fourth summer at an extreme sports camp in Alaska. She runs the "ice camp" there - glamping tents on Matanuska Glacier. Eileen and I went to see her and managed to fit in an incredible Gulf of Alaska sightseeing trip. We saw orcas, seals, sea otters, eagles, all kinds of other wildlife, and glaciers of course. We did TWO helicopter rides/glacier landings, plus a guided trek on Matanuska - climbing up on down the ice (no rappelling) and jumping across crevasses, as well as one night glamping. I think I mentioned in last year's letter that I've been working on an innovative tobacco prevention project. The Town of Brookline passed a Tobacco Free Generation by-law four years ago and was sued by Big Tobacco. The lawsuit made it all the way to the MA Supreme Judicial Court. In March the SJC rendered a unanimous decision in favor of Brookline's authority to adopt this policy. Since then, six of the seven communities that are in my Tobacco Prevention Collaborative have adopted the regulation - now called NFG (Nicotine Free Generation). Recently Concord and Manchester also adopted. And at a November 25th "NFG Celebration" at the State House, three state legislators announced that they will be

filing NFG legislation in January. It's no slam dunk. Still lots of work to be done on the local level but this is a huge step in potentially completely eradicating the harms of tobacco use – not just health but financial. A pack of Marlboro's costs \$14.00. That adds up over the course of a year. Or a lifetime. And for young people many other opportunity costs – high school athletics, can't join the military or become a police officer or firefighter. Very proud of our work so far but, again, we're not done yet.
