California's recent wet winter has eased political tensions over water issues, contributing to a more cooperative dynamic between the federal government and state officials. Increased water availability has reduced the urgency to challenge existing water rules, although experts remain concerned about the future reliability of water in the state. EPA asks court to pause asbestos rule litigation

The Environmental Protection Agency is asking the US Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit for a six-month pause in litigation regarding a rule that phases out chrysotile asbestos, as it aims to reassess provisions that affect chlorine manufacturers. The EPA plans to review whether the rule's requirements exceed the 2016 Toxic Substances Control Act amendments and to potentially revise workplace protections. **Full Story:** [Bloomberg Law](#) (6/17)

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SCOTUS to hear oil companies' appeal on La. lawsuits

The US Supreme Court has agreed to hear an appeal by Chevron, ExxonMobil and other oil companies to move lawsuits from two Louisiana parishes to federal court. The parishes, Plaquemines and Cameron, accuse the companies of damaging coastal marshlands over decades, and the oil companies argue that the cases should be in federal court because the actions were taken under federal contracts during World War II. **Full Story:** [U.S. News & World Report](#) (6/16),

Poultry farms in Oklahoma raise water usage alarm

The rapid expansion of industrial poultry farms in southeast Oklahoma, particularly those supplying Tyson Foods, has raised concerns about water usage from the Antlers aquifer. Residents worry about the depletion and potential contamination of groundwater, exacerbated by a loophole allowing

farms to use water without permits. "Our law is designed to deplete the aquifer. It is designed to mine the water for economic purposes," said Sara Gibson of the Oklahoma Water Resources Board.

Northern Colorado taps aquifer for future water needs

The Fort Collins Loveland Water District in Colorado has bought into an aquifer near the state's border with Wyoming and will work with Front Range H2O Transfer to tap into it by 2029. The project will help provide drinking water supplies as the area's population surges. "Most surface water needs to be supplied and also treated. FEMA cuts \$150M for South Florida flood control projects

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has canceled \$150 million in grants for South Florida flood control, citing a need to minimize waste and align with executive priorities. Sustainability key to Queens Botanical Garden project

The New York City Department of Cultural Affairs and the Department of Design and Construction have begun a \$34 million project to build the Joan N. and Norman Bluestone Education Center at the Queens Botanical Garden. The project will feature sustainable design elements, including solar panels and a stormwater management system integrated into a bioswale. The system will help direct

MIT device pulls drinking water from air without power

Engineers from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology have developed an atmospheric water harvester that captures water vapor from the air and produces safe drinking water without a power source. The window-sized device, made from a hydrogel material, was tested in California's Death Valley and produced up to 160 milliliters of water per day, even in low humidity.
